As you can see from the photographs, they are already making a big difference!







SCIENCE

In Physics as part of the “Electricity in home” topic, Y9 have been learning about electrical safety and how to wire a plug.

The separate battery can then be removed from the car and placed into homes to run electrical devices and appliances, thus saving money and reducing the strain on the national grid.

Mrs Hardy's Y9 group dissected a pig heart this term to help us understand the structure of the heart and how it pumps blood around our body. The group were very excited and worked well. Well done!
