

DON'T PANIC

Qualification results

In the days and weeks running up to results day many students, parents and teachers worry about not getting the hoped-for grades. But whatever the outcome there are always options.

On the day If the student is attending school to receive their results, they will receive an envelope with them in. They do not have to be opened straight away however, the school will have teachers on hand to give professional guidance to help if there are any unexpected results. So it may be a good idea to take advantage of this support.

GCSE Results - What next?

Heading to 6th form or college?

Results as expected - If the results are as predicted it should be a smooth transition. If the student has had a change of mind about the course or want to check what else is possible then it may be worth looking at other options.

Results worse than expected - Though it may feel devastating for a young person there are always options. Firstly contact your college or 6th form to discuss your options. It may still be possible if the grades are 4 and above including maths and English, alternatively try a different college or 6th form.

Results better than expected - If the student has done better than predicted then normally this will not affect their next steps. It may mean that you can go straight onto a level 3 course instead of level 2, so speak to your chosen college/6th form and see what they can offer.

Heading for an apprenticeship? Some apprenticeships require GCSEs in English and maths, grade 4 or above. If the student has not achieved these grades, contact the training provider as they may still beagle to offer an apprenticeship alongside retaking English and maths.
